

Increased capacity of developing countries to implement international standards and gain and maintain market access














Implementation of WTO SPS Agreement

Right to protect human, animal, plant life or health



Obligation to avoid unnecessary and unjustified barriers to trade

Project Preparation Grants

Seed funding (up to \$50,000)

- Develop SPS capacity building projects
- Apply capacity evaluation / prioritization tools
 - Assess feasibility before project development
- Promote synergies with other initiatives and mobilize resources

Focus on projects that:


- identify, develop or disseminate good practice

STDF mobilizes additional resources from governments, donors and the private sector to scale-up impact


STDF builds SPS capacity in developing countries

Projects/PPGs 2004-2017, US\$ millions






STDF's investment supports farmers, processors, traders and governments to meet international standards, protect health, and access global markets

Enhancing trade for coffee farmers in Papua New Guinea (STDF/PG/553)

Value: US\$1,13 M (730 K requested + 400 K form CIC)

- Food safety and quality management system for production and processing (control pests)
- National protocol for coffee production and processing (based on Codex)
- Peer group training (ToT) programme (1,500 smallholders)
- Barista training programme (local consumption, tourism)





Supporting Africa, Latin America and Southeast Asia to meet pesticide standards for export

Public-private collaboration

New skills to generate and review pesticide residue data

10 new residue studies with data for 10+ new Codex MRLs


